Fiorello La Guardia said "Only a well-fed, well-housed, well-schooled people can enjoy the blessings of liberty." La Guardia said this in 1934, shortly after being sworn in as the mayor of New York City. He was defending the poor citizens of New York City and holding the plutocrats of Wall Street accountable for their abuses of power. As someone who learned about the corrupt Wall Street bankers and their effect on the government in school, I find this quote, as well as many of La Guardia's political beliefs, incredibly admirable.
