Women of War: The Italian Assassins, Spies and Couriers Who Fought the Nazis

By Suzanne Cope

Dutton Publishers, 2025; 500 pages

At last! A book about women in *la Resistanza*! Four particular women: Carla Capponi who made bombs in a basement bunker in Rome, then delivered them to partisan soldiers at the Italian northern border; Bianca Guidetti Serra who rode her bicycle through the Alps to deliver news and munitions to the anti-Fascist armies hidden there; Teresa Mattei, who carried secret messages and hid bombs; Anita Malavasi who led troops across the Apennine Mountains on life-threatening missions.

Women of all social classes who knew nothing of political events were offered political education classes, created pamphlets and learned to work together on common cause that there be "... bread, peace and freedom." They met in cemeteries and basements. They were an important part of the Committee for National Liberation, dedicated to "... resist

the bullying of a tyranny that has already been condemned by history." They harbored Jews and helped them to escape the Nazis. One of Bianca's friends was Primo Levi, who was sent to Fossoli, Italy's only internment camps.

"Tens of thousands of women supported one hundred thousand men who would take up arms against the Nazis and Italian Fascists." I'm not surprised that these women's heroic stories helped to launch the feminist movement in Italy after the war.

Women of War is based on past interviews with the protagonists, archival documents, their photographs from family or historical institutes in Tuscany and Reggio Emilia. It is so abundant in scope and information that I can barely touch upon a few stories here. If you're a history buff, I'd say it's required reading.

On November 13 at 2pm at the Selby Library Auditorium downtown Sarasota, Dr. Mary A. Watt, Professor of Medieval Italian Literature and Culture at the University of Florida in Gainesville engaged GCICS members and guests in a riveting lecture entitled, "Lions and Tigers and Bears – Oh My! Dante's Inferno and the Yellow Brick Road to Salvation" about redemption and the journey to getting "on the right path." Calling upon popular culture icons that mirror Dante's message, like The Wizard of Oz, Fellini's La Dolce Vita, and Apocalypse Now among other movies, she connected the

fourteenth century masterpiece to modern times, emphasizing its continued relevancy.

The question-and-answer portion of the lecture was a robust segment, in and of itself, with insightful and provocative questions that Dr. Watt addressed with clarity, elaboration, and humor.

Each participant received a free raffle ticket for Dr. Watt's most recent book, Dante's Golden Legend, for which she drew the winning number and graciously signed the book.
