

# Review of the Wine Tasting Event

# By George Arfield ITALIAN WINERIES WEATHERING CLIMATE CHANGE

Long-time GCICS member and qualified wine enthusiast George Muller led a sip-and-sample gathering on March 31 to share insights about how wineries in northern Italy are meeting the challenges caused by climate changes.

The remarks were a distillation of experiences and tastings collected by George and Linda Muller during their most recent visit to ancient vineyards in the Trentino and Alto Adige provinces. To intensify the experience of tasting three lesser-known wines each participant sampled a selection of imported Italian salumi and cheeses.

The event was held in the clubhouse of Phillippi Landings, the association that is home to GCICS members George and Pam Arfield. In front of each guest seat were three stemmed wine glasses and individual plates, prepared by Beth Rose and Pam, holding a variety of premium cold meats and cheeses.

As George proceeded with his presentation attendees learned how temperatures that have been on a steady rise for several years have spawned increased interest in growing grapes that can match the changes in the weather. He focused —and guests sampled—three wines that were new to most.

The first wine sampled was a white, "Saladin Pilastri Falerio", a refreshingly very dry multigrape white blend that subtly changed mouth and finish if sipped after a bite of prosciutto or similar salty cured meat. It bore a faint resemblance to Pinot Grigio. Its delicate, fruity character is accomplished by a blend of three different grape varieties: Trebbiano, Passerina and Pecorino.

It was followed by two reds: a Kupelwieser Lagrein and a Sonoroso Taraldego Dark Red. The former a solid red that tasted somewhere between a Merlot and a Malbec and the latter a robust, hard-to-ignore red that rose in mouth and had a lingering finish, especially if accompanied with nibbles of the exquisite semisoft Taleggio cheese served to each guest.

Finally, George demonstrated the versatility of the reds by combining them into a blend that, depending on the characteristics of each grape, could be adjusted to changes imposed by the ongoing climate changes.

All wine and food were locally sourced: the wines from Total Wines and the cold meats and cheeses from La Violetta.



# Robert Garland Bowden Essay

The Cultural Influence of Joe DiMaggio



Joe DiMaggio is a very important and influential person to the development of the United States

as a nation. On the surface, Joe DiMaggio was just a baseball player that was very good at his

craft, but if you look deeper, he was much more important to the U.S. than he looks. Joe DiMaggio was a Hall of Fame centerfielder for the New York Yankees. He is regarded as one of the best to ever playing. He would compete in 1,736 games before retiring. He was enshrined into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1955 (DiMaggio, Joe). While Joe DiMaggio was starring on the field for the Yankees and winning games, he was just as influential off the field for Italian American immigrants. DiMaggio was one of the first major Italian Americans to be considered a cultural icon. When DiMaggio was playing baseball, Italian Americans were seen as different from other the white Americans in their "religion, dark complexion and inability to speak English, they were regarded as unwanted foreigners and were treated harshly" (Russo). Due to these reasons, most Italian immigrants lived in poverty and in really rough neighborhoods. During this time, lynchings were not uncommon for Italian immigrants. One of the biggest lynchings in American history came "in 1891 when 11 Italian immigrants were beaten, shot and hanged in New Orleans" (Russo). During WWII, Italians were treated even worse due to their home country fighting on the opposite

side of the war than the U.S. The turning point came when Italian Americans started to become very good at baseball and went to go play professionally. This allowed for some Italian Americans to gain status as a celebrity. Their celebrity helped break down the cultural barrier that let to Italian Americans being ostracized in the U.S. Of these players, Joe DiMaggio was the most famous due to his incredible achievements on the diamond. He played for the Yankees, the most popular team in baseball at that time and is still today. He won 9 World Series Championships, 13 All-Star selections, and 3 MVP awards (Russo). It was safe to say that the best player on the best team in

the most popular sport was very well known across the U.S. DiMaggio, and other Italian American celebrities, not only changed the way that Italian Americans were perceived by others, but also how Italian Americans perceived themselves. DiMaggio gave Italian Americans hope they could possibly reach that level of stardom (Russo). This would allow them to escape the situation that Italian-Americans had been in since they started to immigrate to the U.S. Joe DiMaggio allowed a children's hospital in Hollywood, Florida, to use his name and likeness in order to increase their fundraising efforts. His only stipulation was that "No child will ever be turned away because of inability to pay." (Joe DiMaggio Children's). This, as much as anything, shows the power and influence of Joe DiMaggio.
